Chief Executive Officer Human Development Foundation (HDF) Mr. Mehoob ul Haq lays the foundation brick at ground-breaking ceremony for rehabilitation of flood affected villages on January 31, 2023 held at Meer Deenar Khan Brohi in Jacobabad, Sindh. After completion of damage assessment and formation of Village Development Organization (VDO), reconstruction of climate resilient housing has started. HDF is transforming flood affected villages into model villages. The District Administration of Jacobabad has allocated one of the worst-hit villages, Goth Meer Deenar Khan Brohi to HDF for rehabilitation and transformation.

HDF rehabilitation program is designed to ensure a coordinated and integrated service delivery, built upon an assimilated approach reflecting its forte and core strengths which will ensure:

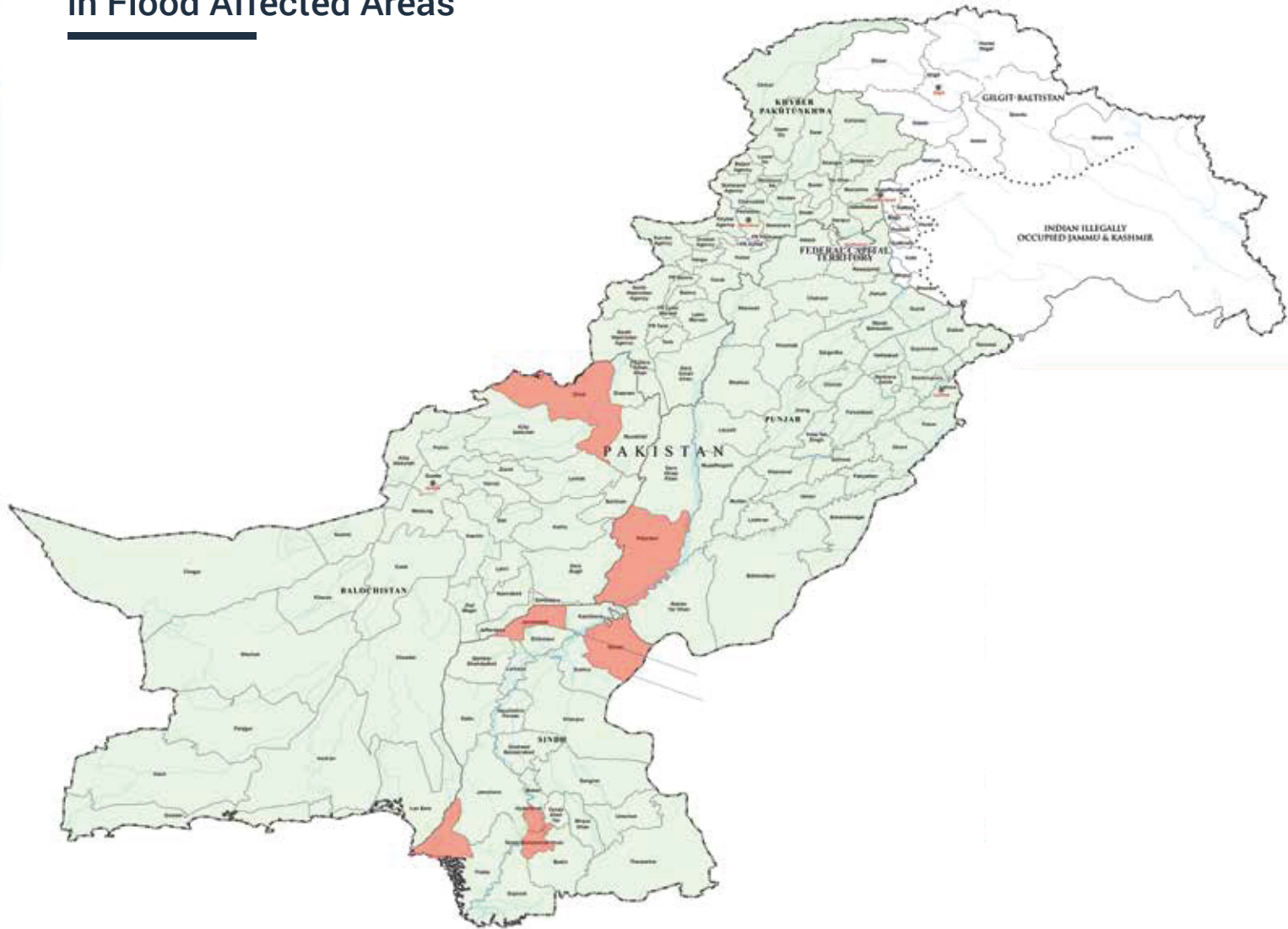

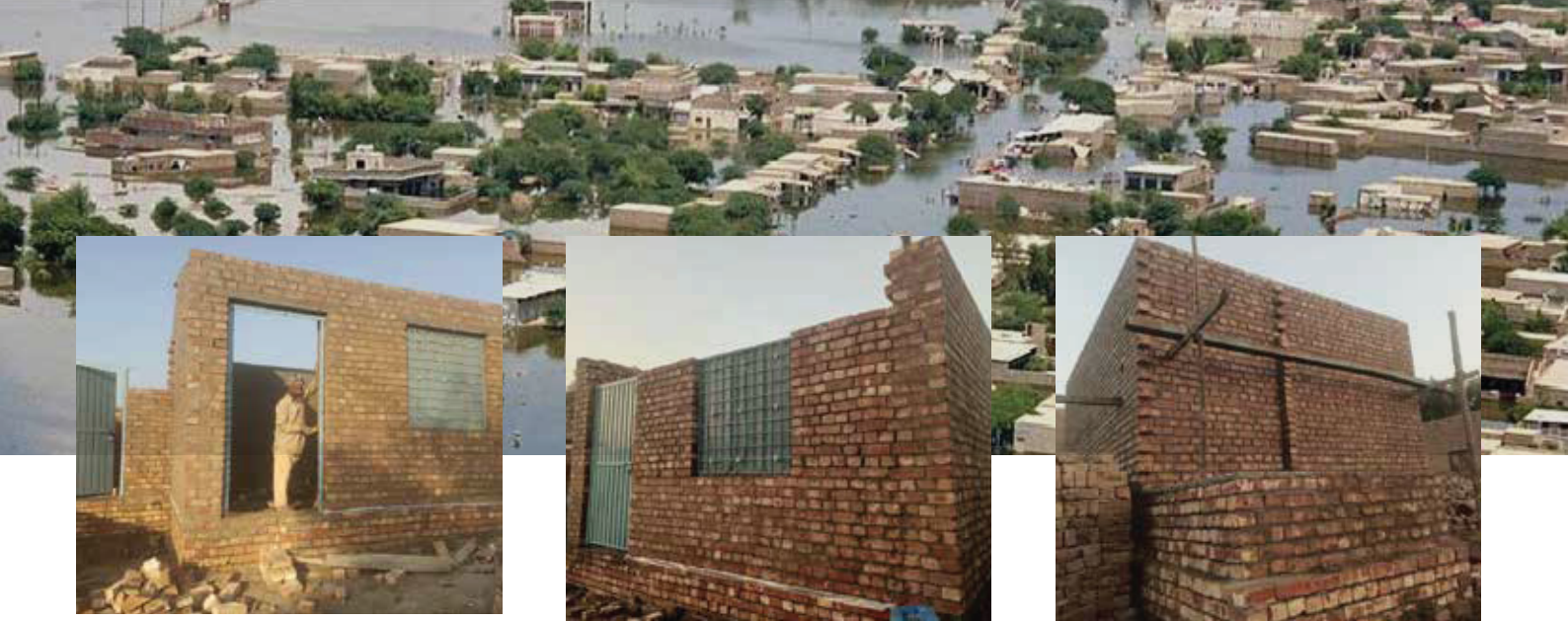

HDF's Roadmap to Rebuild the Lives of Flood Survivors

Reconstruction of houses in flood affected areas: Building Back Better

As we move on, most flood-hit families are still sleeping under the open sky, in tents or makeshift shelters. Over 30 million people have been displaced and are forced to live in fragile structures that are uninhabitable with poor living conditions.

HDF believes in sustainable development and therefore plans to construct houses for the flood affected population whose homes had been completely demolished due to the recent flooding in Rajanpur, Jacobabad, and Ghotki. We are taking a community participatory approach whereby the construction of a model house in all three districts is completed. This model house is being replicated by community members with the help of HDF, placing them at the center of the recovery phase. The model is a low-cost high-impact design that will be capable of withstanding future calamities apart from harsh weather conditions while protecting the beneficiaries' dignity. The housing unit comprises of one bedroom with attached bathroom and a kitchen covering about 360 sq. ft. area. Our technical partners are MAVEN projects, who are leading consultants and experts in delivering quality designing and cost-effective construction.

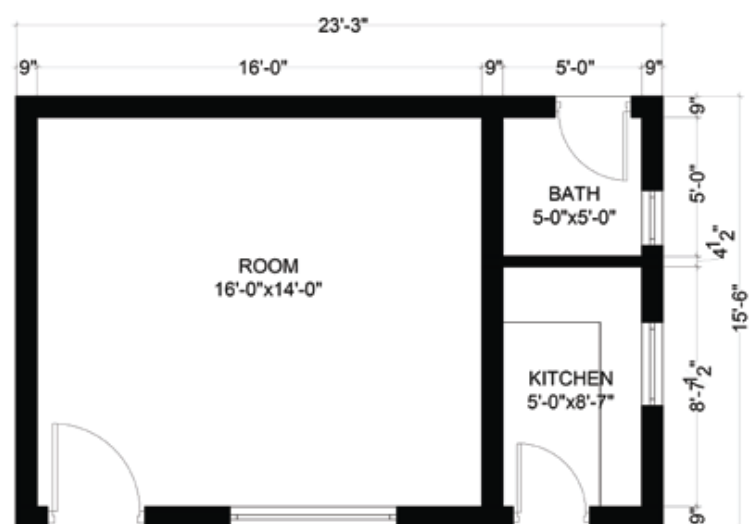

Rebuilding Lives



Shazia Mai, a 38 year old widow and single mother of four children, is a resident of Kachi Abadi (meaning: slum) in Rojhan, Rajanpur; one of the districts that has been most affected by recent flooding in Pakistan due to its geographical location and extreme weather conditions. Shazia's husband Maqsood Ahmed died three years ago. Since then she has no source of income and her only two sons, who are under 18 years of age, are working as child labourers to support their family. Shazia was sound asleep with her two children sleeping next to her in their tiny home when the flood water surged through the door and windows. Startled, upon hearing the screams of fellow villagers, Shazia grabbed her children and rushed out to the nearest raised road embankment managing a safe escape. She had no shelter and it took weeks for the first relief supplies to reach her location.

"It was only after HDF came to Rojhan", Shazia says, "that I recieved relief goods along with a temporary shelter in the form of tent".

Shazia's house was fully-damaged in the floods. As the water levels reduced and the villagers returned to what was left of their homes, she had no place to take shelter in. Shazia was the first recipient of HDF's Model House constructed in Rajanpur in the rehabilitation phase of its 'Emergency Assistance Program'.

In any crisis, women and children are usually the hardest hit, and being highly vulnerable they are often the least able to recover from the effects of natural disasters. Shazia is one of the many millions of Pakistanis reeling from the floods and are still waiting for your help.
